**October Demo.**  
**Table Lamp by Peter Mullanvey**



Spinning tops were the competition entries for this month and many of us were distracted by the various designs and spinning properties of the items on the entry table, as we passed by; but no distractions for our demonstrator, who was giving full attention to organising and generally getting everything as right as possible for his demo; which he started right after the Chairpersons introduction. Displaying a completed table lamp (except for the electrical wiring) he explained the design philosophy which involved using a full scale outline drawing of the stem or column for ease of marking out, especially when replicas or companion sets were been made.

Using native kiln dried sycamore the base was chuck mounted and rapidly turned to shape and correct size (approx. 8ins. diam. by 2ins. deep) with a tool Peter shaped by grinding from a ½ HTS in round steel bar and used in various shearing-scraping- cutting modes; the different tool angles and tool positions explained as the shavings streamed from the edge. With base shaped and drilled for lamp stem it was removed from chuck ready for drilling for electric cable. To ensure accurate drilling, Peter made a table and fitted it with a stem which fitted in the tool rest holder. This was adjusted to position and provide a platform for the lamp base as it was moved forward on to lathe driven 5/16 in. drill; with tailstock assistance as necessary. The table made was to suit the lathe being used and was 8in. by 3in. approx. with stem 6/7ins. By 1in diam. hole was drilled across the grain.

Lamp stem started as a 4in. square section of kiln died native sycamore 12 in. long, mounted between centres and rounded with a large rouging gouge. Here Peter demonstrated the various cutting modes suitable for this type of gouge; - cutting on its back, on its side with either wing, forward or backward, and practically inverted so as to get a smooth cut similar to a skew. Boring for the electric cable was next, (before external shaping) using the Sorby long hole boring tool and hallow ring centre - through the hollow tail stock; with explanations of the process as it progressed; - the do's and don'ts - some of which are –

- drill at a low speed,
- drill only ½ way from each end,
- withdraw the tool after drilling 1in. and
- remove swarf, or wood dust from tool,

Excessive push or force should not be necessary, it may cause tool overheating, tool jamming , or the tool to wander from the straight and then holes may not meet, especially in longer stems; So very quickly and smoothly 5/16 in holes were bored from each end and met obviously head on. Peter lost no time to remount the stem between centres, increased the lathe speed and after positioning the full scale outline drawing of the stem on the bed bars underneath, the positions of the high points, coves and beads were transferred with pencil, and turned to size, as measured continuously by calipers, a specially ground scraper and bowl gouge, in addition to the rouging gouge skilfully and rapidly used by Peter did the final shaping; a profile or template is used to get the profile of the 7 curves correct and similar to each other. When the stem is finally secured to the base (gluing) the join is blended so that the stem curve is continued into the base curve resulting in a refined subtlety to the joint.

Finally sincere thanks to Peter for an action packed demonstration where his teaching and turning skills were delivered wholeheartedly all through for a very enjoyable and informative morning.
